What is a Lawyer?

A lawyer is a licensed professional who advises and represents individuals, businesses, or government entities in legal matters. Lawyers act as advocates, advisors, and negotiators to protect their clients' rights and interests.



Advocate

Represents clients in courts and tribunals, presenting arguments and evidence



Advisor

Provides legal counsel to individuals and organizations on rights and obligations



Negotiator

Mediates disputes and negotiates settlements on behalf of clients

Submit 10+2 marksheets, category certificates, ID proof

Internship Tips

- Start interning from 2nd year of law school
- Try diverse areas before choosing specialization
- Each internship typically lasts 2-4 weeks
- Maintain a record of all internships for your CV
- Network with professionals during internships
- Request a certificate/letter of recommendation
- Focus on research and drafting skills
- Attend court proceedings during litigation internships

Moot Courts, Debates & Legal Aid Clinics are equally important for practical skill development.



Bar Council Registration & Licensing

All India Bar Examination (AIBE)

After completing your LLB, you must pass the AIBE conducted by the Bar Council of India to receive a 'Certificate of Practice' and start practicing as an advocate in any court across India.

Steps to Become a Practicing Advocate

- 1 Complete LLB degree from a BCI-recognized university
- 2 Apply to your State Bar Council for provisional enrolment
- 3 Clear the All India Bar Examination (AIBE)
- 4 Receive Certificate of Practice — you are now an Advocate!

Frequently Asked Questions

Q1. Is maths required for studying law?

No. Students from any stream (Science, Commerce, Arts) can pursue law. CLAT has a small Quant section, but basic maths is sufficient.

Q2. Can I become a lawyer through distance education?

The Bar Council of India does not recognize distance-mode LLB programs. You must attend a regular, BCI-approved program.

Q3. What is the difference between an Advocate and a Lawyer?

All advocates are lawyers, but not all lawyers are advocates. An 'advocate' is specifically enrolled with a Bar Council and can appear in court.

Q4. How many years does it take to become a lawyer?

Minimum 5 years after 10+2 (5-year LLB) or 6 years (3-year LLB after graduation + AIBE). Total: 5-6 years of study.

Q5. Is it necessary to do LLM after LLB?

No, LLM is optional. It is recommended for those interested in academia, specialization, or international legal careers.
